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Course Description

For students new to the field of sociology, sociological writings are generally difficult to read and sociological concepts are difficult to understand. This course offers an opportunity for students to strengthen their abilities to read and digest sociological essays, and learn to think sociologically through those essays, before they proceed with their journeys in sociology.

Since this is a small-size class targeting major students, it also serves as a formal part of departmental academic mentoring programme. Our Department expects the teacher of Approaching Sociology in a “mentor” position and up to one-third of the course hours should be academic counseling activities. As such, the purpose of Approaching Sociology is not only to guide Year One/Two students in their early encounter with sociology, but also to serve as an opportunity for students and their respective teacher to nurture a mentor-mentee relationship that continues after the course has ended. Ultimately, we hope our students can be better adjusted to studying in the sociology programme.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, students are expected to be able to:

- (1) Familiarize themselves with the sociological approach to social phenomena and the fundamental vocabulary and perspectives by which sociologists study them.
- (2) Be aware of the importance of a variety of study skills (reading, analysis, writing and presentation) essential to the sociology curriculum.
- (3) Apply basic concepts in sociology to analyze social phenomena.

Course Assessment

- 1. Group presentation of weekly reading 20%**
- 2. Individual identification of objectives of 5 readings 8%**
- 3. Individual mini-essays on weekly readings 36 %**
- 4. Group presentation of sociological skeleton 20%**
- 5. Class participation 16%**
